Since its inception in 1978, all services have been provided free of charge to patients and their families; VHOCC does not bill any government agency for its services.

VHOCC MEDICAL EQUIPMENT LENDING CLOSET


The medical equipment lending closet program is located at the new VHOCC office, 829 East 8th Street, Port Angeles.

Volunteer Hospice's History Evolves from the Polar Bear Dip

In 1989, the first Polar Bear dippers comprised of Dan Welden, its leader, and two others, Gale Hunter and Dale Bush, plunged into the ice cold water of the Straits.

These three members of the Olympic Peninsula's Runners Club, obviously tired of the hum drum life in winter here, decided to shake things up. Dan had a background in cold water dips having reached his goal of plunging into the lakes at 5000' in the Seven Lakes Basin. Gale and Dale who accompanied him at Hollywood Beach, doubtless believed that with a survivor like this, a continuous life on planet Earth was assured.

No one recalls anyone who witnessed this wild plunge, but it has grown over the last few years to over a hundred participants of all ages with the oldest thus far being Dr. Ed Hopfner, once Volunteer Hospice Board President and current board member, who dove in well into his eighties. Now that the event has morphed into not one but three plunges, the challenging cry is "You don't get older, just colder."

Besides, who's counting? Dan says, "It gives you a chance to hoot and holler and get crazy without getting arrested."

Because the water temperature hovers around 47 degrees, a nice bonfire is set up on the beach by Jon Jacobs, a longtime friend of Dan. Hot drinks provided by the Red Lion Inn and muffins provided by Volunteer Hospice await the participants and spectators. You are on your own for anything stronger.

In 2012, VHOCC volunteer Lori Jacobs had the good idea to make the Dip a fundraiser for Volunteer Hospice. This year, \$3200 were raised, with over half of it raised by Debbie Crumb, one of Rose Crumb's daughters. So it seems that the energy and enthusiasm for the Polar Bear Plunge is assured. With the growth of "selfies" who knows how popular this may become?

As a volunteer with VHOCC's medical equipment lending closet program, I am happy to be just another elf in Rose Crumb's army.

While giving priority to VHOCC's hospice clients, this free service is available to anyone in the community who finds themselves or a loved one in need of assistive devices or supplies to help make life a little easier. Whether a temporary illness, recent surgery, or visiting relative precipitates the need, help can be just a phone call away. Not only does the right equipment add a measure of ease and safety for the patient and the caregiver in necessary daily tasks, but it often makes participation in the more pleasurable aspects of life, such as continued engagement with the rest of the community, possible again.

Borrowers are often surprised by how simple the process is. Somehow, that seems fitting to founder Rose Crumb's philosophy of providing aid and comfort as the first priority, and red tape being as minimal as possible.

A wide variety of equipment – from incontinence supplies and bedside commodes to walkers, shower benches, and wheelchairs – is available for the asking. Everything is on a first-come, first-served, basis. Some of the more technical equipment, such as specialized wheelchairs and hospital beds, is primarily reserved for VHOCC patients. But when available, hospital beds are delivered and assembled by our skilled and cheerful volunteer delivery team.

As the widow of a Vietnam veteran who eventually became a double amputee and largely bedbound, I am well aware of the benefits of the right equipment in terms of quality of life as well as the barriers of cost and bureaucracy that can make obtaining it a daunting task. It is with great pleasure that I spend two hours per week helping to keep this valuable community service going for the benefit of others at no cost to the agency, which depends greatly on the work of its many volunteers.

In the medical equipment lending closet program, I have found my niche as a VHOCC volunteer. I am able to use my past experience as well as my enthusiasm for assistive technology and the agency's mission to both benefit the community and honor the memory of my late husband.

VHOCC depends on its volunteers to lend their support in a variety of ways, both big and small. This is what makes its free services possible. What might your contribution be?
