# Rosalinda Castiglioni

More than 30 years ago, bereavement volunteer Rosalinda Castiglioni's husband died following an extended hospitaliza-

tion. Rosalinda was raising a two-year-old daughter and working full-time at a university in Taiwan. "After I lost him, I started healing by learning from the experiences of others, appreciating each person's journey and sharing. As a result, I continue to heal and more than I ever could alone. The VHOCC Grief and Bereavement programs help me and provide comfort to individuals living with loss and grief. It's a safe, supportive, and powerful environment. I have also seen many friendships develop in the groups. A kinship forms with others through shared pain."

Rosalinda has an impressive background in psychology and counseling. She's a teacher at heart, and she has the heart for giving. Rosalinda has been serving as a group leader at VHOCC since her retirement six years ago.

She finds joy in giving back to others, as she was so fortunate years ago to have been surrounded by love and support when she needed it most, especially from her church. Rosalinda also learns from her cultural heritage. She said, "In the Filipino community, family and friends surround a bereaved person and provide ongoing support."

# **Remembering Loved Ones**

#### How is VHOCC different from other hospices?

VHOCC is a local, independent nonprofit organization, serving the population of Clallam County at no charge. VHOCC does not bill any insurance company or government agency for services.

**Empowering**— A series of workshops on practical matters for those who are living alone is being offered to the community from May 19 to July 14. The series "Empower Yourself: Practical Tools For Living Alone" will assist individuals to live alone or prepare to live alone, manage everyday problems that may arise when they live alone, and confront daily living after the loss of a loved one. Facilitators will give practical guidelines including home and car maintenance, shopping and cooking for one, household finances, consumer protection and fraud prevention, and self -care. The free series of workshops will be held on a biweekly basis, on Wednesdays, with some workshops in person and some on Zoom. In person meetings will be limited to a small group to respect current meeting guidelines. #### **Patients Are Our Teachers**

Volunteer Hospice of Clallam County nurse Haley Blackburn-Jacobs says, "Often my patients become my mentors because I am awed by a patient's recognition and adaptability, knowing that death is a part of their life. I am humbled and grateful to be a witness to serve the patient." She also encourages families and caregivers to be quiet and listen because patients are our teachers. "Whether we are caregivers or the receivers of care, we all have narratives and stories that are special. Each patient is recognized as someone with their own extraordinary journey, and we need to honor that rather than only focusing on their end of life."

Seven years ago, VHOCC nurse Haley lost her sister, Tina Joy, to cervical cancer after a 2-year battle. Tina was a patient in a hospice. It was serendipity that Haley discovered VHOCC when she read VHOCC founder Rose Crumb's obituary in a local newspaper before her move to the Olympic Peninsula. Haley embraces the hospice philosophy of care centered on comfort and relief from suffering.
